

From the Desk of Jeanne Plank, RVP

omething To Think About– In spite of unseasonable rain and cold, the 2011 iris season arrived, bringing anticipated pleasures (and disappointments–like sparse bloom at trek time), activities, and obligations.

If you are part of the AIS Judges' program, I trust you made every effort to meet its obligations. Missing the Activity Report and Garden Award voting deadlines have obvious undesirable consequences for Judges and aspiring Judges alike.

Another important deadline still lies ahead—the AIS Symposium. Because there are no dire penalties for not voting, the AIS Symposium deadline can creep up, slip by, and leave you with your vote un-cast.

The AIS Symposium Ballot deadline is September 1st.

Certainly a prime objective for the Summer Edition, RVP message is to urge *all* AIS members to vote the AIS Tall Bearded Symposium ballot. If you remember my Winter Edition message, you know I feel strongly about voting the Symposium. The necessary information on how to accomplish this important task (it's easy) is in this Bulletin. So—**vote the Symposium ballot**. (And, vote on **time**!)

Another matter of regional interest to think about is the future of Region 14 regional meetings. Region 14 holds two regional meetings annually. Region Bylaws define when these meetings are held, and specify activities that are required to take place during these events.

It has become increasingly difficult to find affiliates to host either of these two annual meetings. The workload that comes with hosting either one of these events, but particularly the Spring Regional—coupled with the financial burden the affiliate assumes with either of them—takes a lot of the glamour out of being the host.

With much validity, an argument often offered by affiliates is that their membership is getting older; in addition, a valid observation frequently offered is that their particular group just doesn't have gardens appropriate for a spring regional trek. Add the workload that comes with guest irises and the expenses in dealing with rising hotel facility costs, the commitment to host can be quite daunting, especially when fund raising opportunities for the affiliate are limited.

Although fall regionals are less formidable to host than spring regionals, there is no big rush by affiliates to host even a fall regional.

Currently—to our good fortune—the next two spring regionals have affiliate hosts—Monterey Bay Iris Societ in 2012, and Sacramento Iris Society in 2013.

Beyond 2013, it would appear that Region 14 will again act as host, as it has for three of the regionals hel over the past year and a half: Modesto, Fairfield, and coming up, Redding.

Having the Region host regionals is not necessarily a bad thing, but it does seem to indicate that a reconsideration of how Region 14 conducts regionals would be appropriate, and might even lead to better and more beneficial regional functions through thoughtful consideration of new ways to meet our organizational obligations, enjoy our mutual interests, and not drain our financial resources. This is something we should all be thinking about. This is something that should be openly and thoroughly discussed at regional meetings.

Come to the 2011 fall meeting in Redding. Perhaps in thoughtful and realistic discussion, with open minds, we can consider new ways to revitalize this, our very special region, without taxing our resources, our patience, and our enjoyment of irises and each other! Something to think about

Kaitlin Wins Student Scholarship

Each year, Region 14 awards a \$500 scholarship to a high school senior or college student who demonstrates an interest in iris activities within Region 14, or pursuing a career in horticulture, floriculture, landscaping, nursery production, or related fields. The intention of the scholarship program is to promote interest in iris and related fields.

For 2011, the scholarship committee, chair Terri Hudson, recommended awarding this scholarship to Kaitlin Brice who provided this essay as part of her application for this scholarship. Congratulations, Kaitlin!

"I am an active member in Region 14 of the American Iris Society and have been since I was a young kid. When I was about nine or ten years old, I entered some cut iris into a show in Sacramento along with my older brother who also entered some flowers.

My mother is a commercial iris grower in our hometown of Nicolaus where she runs a farm called Peruzzi's Iris Farm. It is a business started by my grandmother who then passed it on to my mother and our family. In the spring, the garden is open to customers and I help show them around, tell them about the garden and its history, and help them calculate their total purchase. My parents and older brother are usually there as well, but sometimes it is just myself so I run the whole show. In the off-season, when the irises are not in bloom, I assist my family in the upkeep of the garden and also pot up new iris to sell in the Spring. The garden is beautiful in the spring and love to watch the wonder on the customers' face as they take in all of the sights and smells of the flowers.

The garden has influenced me to want to pursue a degree in biology or ecology, and I have a strong passion to care for the environment. I also love volunteer work for people or places that need it, writing and taking care of animals. l plan to attend a community college this fall and for the next two years, then I plan to transfer to Humboldt State University to earn my bachelor's degree."

Impressive Irisarian—Keith Keppel

Have you ever heard of Keith Keppel? Keith is one of the world's renowned iris hybridizers. Region 14 is very fortunate to have Keith as the guest speaker for the 2011 Fall Regional in Redding this coming October 15th. He is a down-to-earth man and is very modest when asked about his hybridizing. However, it does not take long to realize that he is one the masters in the iris world. Keith became interested in irises after discovering a planting of them in a neighboring garden. One of his outstanding acquisitions was 'Snow Flurry' (Rees '39). He began selling irises in California when he was in high school during the 1950's and he soon started a mail-order business. He graduated from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, with a degree in Ornamental Horticulture and an interest in plant breeding. He began hybridizing in 1954.

In 1957, he learned of the American Iris Society from an ad in a gardening magazine. He quickly sent in his membership fee along with an inquiry, "How do I become a judge?" In due time, he completed those requirements and became one of the most astute in that area.

Keith attained an early accomplishment by winning a Dykes Medal in 1972 for one of his introductions, 'Babbling Brook'. He was the first editor of Flight Lines when that feature was added to the AIS Bulletin. He has served a term as vice president of the Median Iris Society. He was a contributing writer for the AIS book, The World of Irises (1978), and several of his articles can be found in the AIS Bulletins. He was appointed to a partial

term on the Board of Directors (1976-1977), AND then was elected to a full term ending in 1980. In 1982, Keith undertook the editorship of the AIS Bulletin, which he held for five years. In 1997, he received the AIS Gold Medal, which is the highest honor the AIS can bestow.

Keith served on the registration committee assisting Kay Nelson in her position as Registrar and Advertising Editor. Upon their marriage in 1992, the office was moved to Stockton, California and, after Keith's retirement from the U.S. Post Office in 1993, moved to Oregon. Following Kay's untimely death in 1994, Keith continued as Registrar, recording registrations and introductions of irises worldwide. He is in charge of compiling and publishing the booklet of Registrations and Introductions, and at the end of the decade, the Iris Checklist.

Keith's area of expertise would be with the bearded irises. He won the Dykes medal again in 2004 for 'Crowned Heads' and a third time 2006 for 'Sea Power'. He is particularly interested in the plicata and luminata patterns, but works with all colors and patterns. Also, Keith works closely with Barry Blythe, a renowned hybridizer from Australia. They grow each other's irises in their respective gardens in order to acclimate them to new areas for easier introductions in their respective countries.

Keith's awards include the Foster Memorial Plaque, the highest award of the British Iris Society, the Dykes Medal, the Distinguished Service Medal and the Hybridizer's Medal. He has also received four Premio Firenze awards.
