The RVP's Garden >



Whew! Am I glad that another iris dig season is over for me, even though I have lots of planting yet to do. I am solarizing two beds and will be planting from pots in late September. Meanwhile I have lots of pots that need to be watered regularly.

Speaking of digging! What a day for a dig! Fair weather greeted us in San

Jose, as we approached Nola's Garden at 8:30 a.m. on Aug. 2, after driving since 5:30 a.m. and meeting up with Cindy Eastman and Kathy Braaten on the way. We had a pickup loaded down with paper bags, boxes, an ice chest, and tools for digging and labeling. In the spirit of Region 14 camaraderie, we were not alone, as there were as many as 15 stalwart members there to help. I wish I had taken down names, but in the frenzied activity of the day, it slipped my mind. I remember most of you by name, but rather than leave someone out, I will just thank you for a hard day's work and I know that you know who you are. I do know that there were representatives from Leo T. Clark, Monterey Bay, Clara B Rees, Sacramento, Sierra Foothills, and James M. Gibson, Sidney B. Mitchell, and Mount Diablo.

It was an all day affair, involving digging, trimming, labeling and distributing over 130 varieties, and approximately 1000 rhizomes. All were distributed to the nine clubs who opted to participate in the distribution, and most were taken home at the end of the day. As shipping has become more and more expensive, the Region requests that clubs reimburse the Region when shipping is necessary. Thanks again to a great work crew, who never slowed down!

As some of you may recall from the 'olden' days, the iris rhizomes from the Spring Regional were auctioned at a central location in the summer following the Spring Regional. Later, when the single auction was not well supported, a system of several auctions throughout the region was tried. Then there was a system of bundling them in \$200 bundles and selling them to the clubs. The

current system of distributing the rhizomes to the clubs who wish to participate and having them reimburse the Region for half of the proceeds from selling them to members, has been the practice for 5-8 years now. There is always room for improvement, so if anyone has an idea to share on this matter, I would be glad to hear it. We have to keep moving forward, and thinking 'outside the box' if we want to keep up with the world which seems to be moving faster and faster. However, there is a restriction: Region 14 has assured the hybridizers who donated these iris that they will not be sold over the internet or directly to the public.

Another critical issue is the annual scholarship that is offered by Region 14 each year, which is budgeted for \$1000 but sometimes is supplemented by clubs and becomes a \$1500 scholarship. Granted, it is so expensive to attend college these days, that \$1000 may not be seem to be the generous amount that it was when the scholarship was begun. I am not sure when this scholarship was initiated, but it has been going at least 16 years, and I am certain that the intention was to provide help to a member's child or grandchild or youth member.

Our current Scholarship Chair, Peggy Ruud, has asked to resign so I am looking for a replacement. She did a good job of contacting schools, receiving the applications and finding readers.

The previous Scholarship Chairs, Jay and Terri Hudson, who were Chairs for 15 years, had a faxing system that had become outdated and did not include any schools in Nevada. This past year, we asked Club Presidents or a member in the club, to contact the High School Districts and Colleges in their area to notify them of this scholarship. From the applications that were received (9), it was obvious to Peggy Ruud that there was not much help from Clubs in distributing this information. Thus, it is not only a challenge to find a new chairperson, but also a new system for distributing this information and application form.

In this regard, we need to remember that we are living in the electronic age and realize that most students will go to their electronic devices for scholarship information, and we need to figure out how to use this to our advantage. If anyone knows how to make the scholarship information that is posted on our web site, come up when a student 'googles' 'Horticulture or Floriculture Scholarships', do let us know.

Here are two ideas that we might use to award the scholarship:

- 1. We could select a college that teaches Horticulture or Floriculture, such as UC Davis, Cal Poly, Fresno State or a city college, to handle the applications and choose the winner from their student body. The cost for administration is often around 6% (information from UCD). This would restrict the scholarship to students at that particular school.
- 2. We could post the application on college web sites, and email the application to the County Offices of Education in each county in Northern CA and NV, and ask them to distribute the application to their high schools. The County Office email addresses are readily available on the Web, and the college web sites are accessible. In this case the scholarship committee would contact the schools electronically, receive and process all the applications and have a committee read and select the candidate, as we have done in the past.

I would like to hear your ideas about this important role in our region. If you have any ideas about how best to administer the scholarship, I would like to hear from you. And, if you would like to head up this important committee, or know of a member who would be good at it, do let me know.

At the Fall Meeting we are scheduled to elect a new director. Each director has a 3 years term in office, and it is now time for Rudy Ciuca to step down as Northern Area Director, and a new director elected. The Northern area includes Sacramento, north to the limit of the region including Reno, Nevada. So put your thinking cap on here too, and be prepared to nominate someone for this office. Of course, they must agree to run for the position. Election is at the Fall Meeting which will be Sat. morning, Oct. 15, 2016.

I am looking forward to seeing all of you at the Fall Regional in Livermore, Oct. 14-15. Presidents of affiliate clubs are expected to attend, and if they can get some financial support from their club to

Judges' Training Report Fall 2016

Region 14 held nine Judges Training (JT) sessions during this past training year (August1, 2015 – July 31, 2016): one classroom session on medians at the Fall Regional in Visalia, one classroom session on judging ethics in Oakland, three sessions in the Las Vegas, Nevada area (one classroom on iris terms, two garden trainings on TBs and medians), one garden session on judging MTBs in Loomis, one garden session on judging bearded irises in San Jose and one classroom session on judging spurias (these two at the Spring Regional), and one garden session on judging bearded seedlings. I would like to thank all the judge-trainers and garden owners who worked so hard to put these classes together. We have a thorough and vigorous JT program in Region 14.

Two JT sessions have already been scheduled for the 2016-17 year: one classroom session on judging the artistic division at iris shows (arrangements) at the Fall 2016 Regional meeting and one classroom session on awards and ballots at the January, 2017 winter potluck of the Sydney B. Mitchell Iris Society. Prospective judges need to remember that training in awards and ballots is required to advance from Apprentice to fully accredited Garden/Exhibition Judge so all Apprentices who have not taken this class during their three-year apprenticeship should sign up for this class. JT sessions will be posted on the Region 14 website, www.aisregion14.org, as are the JT guidelines, application, and other forms.

Everyone who is a judge or preparing to become a judge should read and study their AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials this winter. It will help you better prepare for the training and judging season ahead. Once bloom starts, time seems to get compacted and there is little for concentrated study.

There has been some talk in our Region about the number of blue ribbons being awarded at shows – at times too many, at others too few. Judges should remember to place themselves in the exhibitors' shoes and provide appropriate encouragement to exhibitors. Judges aim to award ribbons and other awards fairly and consistently. In choosing judges, show officials should pick judges for a single show with a range of

experience – from recently appointed judges to highly experienced ones. AIS aims to judge both show and garden specimens consistently and without bias. Only then will our awards program be a true measure of iris performance.




above: Mango Queen (Kerr 2013) HM below: Texas Two Step (G. Sutton 2013)

Interesting Bits and Pieces

1961 - 1964

Finally Region 14 has a complete chronological listing of the service years of all Region 14 RVPs. Part of the problem of some missing years was in the beginning AIS did not have to recognize and appoint RVPs to office as they now do. In the beginning elected RVPs started service on Jan 1 and served until Dec. 31. The three year rule was not yet in effect. The RVP might be in office only one year or several. Some time down the road AIS became more involved in the separate regions. The editor does not know when but the AIS Board began to give approval to RVPs at the annual fall meeting. Even though a region elects an RVP, the AIS Board gives approval or may withhold approval of any RVP elected and no RVP elect may take office until the AIS Fall Board of Directors approves. AIS ruled that the term of office for any RVP will be three years and no more. But AIS will pass approval and reappoint or not reappoint RVPs every year at the annual fall Board meeting. That is why in the early years some RVPs served 1 sometimes 2 years and one RVP served several years. There were no regulations or required AIS approval or term limits in the early years. It is finally straightened out as to who came into the office of RVP and also when that person vacated the office. Clara B. Rees and Snow Flurry

The story of Clara B. Rees started in Ohio where she began working with tulips. When she moved from Ohio to California, she found that the California winters were too mild for proper cultivation of tulips, so she and her sister, Ruth, decided to try iris. Among the first iris that she experimented with were Queen of May and Quaker Lady. Later, they included San Francisco, Thais, and Purissima. Clara transferred the pollen from Thais onto Purissima. The pod of the cross contained only two seeds, one of which was shriveled. She was tempted to throw the second seed away, but decided to plant it anyway, and the result was the world's first ruffled iris, Snow Flurry!

The first year's bloom in 1937 was pleasing so divisions were made. In the second year of bloom both Clara and Ruth felt that this white blossom should be introduced. Legend has it that Ruth took two blossoms, carefully carrying them by train, street car, boat, another train and a taxicab to the Berkeley Hills garden of Carl Salbach for his appraisal and opinion. Mr. Salbach introduced Snow Flurry in 1939 to great acclaim. Snow Flurry has been employed by the iris hybridizers of the world more than any other variety and many of the top 100 iris have Snow Flurry in their lineage. Two of them, Blue Sapphire and Violet Harmony won the Dykes Medal. If Clara B. Rees had produced only Snow Flurry, her contribution would be considered monumental due to the huge influence of this great iris on future generations.
