

Deadlines for submissions are February 1st (Spring issue), May 1st (Summer issue), August 1st (Fall issue) and November 1st (Winter Issue). Rights to all submissions will be treated as unconditionally assigned for publication and copyright purposes, and as subject to the Editor's unrestricted right to edit and comment editorially. Submit text materials via email as an unformatted text file in a standard font. Submit images via email with a minimum resolution of 300 dpi.

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Subscriptions

The Bulletin is distributed electronically, without charge, through the societies of AIS Region 14, and is posted on the website of AIS Region 14. Anyone may request a printed copy of the Bulletin through a AIS Region 14 society or its members.

Advertisements

Iris growers and suppliers of gardening-related goods and services are welcome to advertise in the Bulletin and the Region's website, www.aisregion14.org.

Editor's Notes

The conversion of the Region 14 Bulletin to a digital publication avoids previous costs of about \$5,000 per year for printing and mailing. The digital version also allows quarterly publication and unlimited use of color at no additional cost.

Interested persons now can access the Bulletin on the Internet. AIS members who do not use computers and the Internet can receive the Bulletin with help of their local iris society. Region 14 will defray local iris society costs for providing paper copies of the Bulletin to their local AIS members (see the meeting minutes elsewhere in this Bulletin).

As an online publication, the Bulletin also is freely accessible by interested persons. This openness could encourage some to appreciate the genus iris, and perhaps to join the AIS or an affiliated society.

We have the Region's approval to include garden-related advertising in the Bulletin, but we need an advertising manager to make it happen. Someone could enjoy this way to participate in the Bulletin and support the Region. If you are interested, let me know (tom@karwin. com) and we'll work it out.

We welcome your articles and photos for each issue of the Bulletin. Our deadlines are February 1st, May 1st, August 1st, and November 1st (these are one month before each quarterly publication date). E-mail written material to tom@karwin.com in a text file, e.g., Microsoft Word, not in an Acrobat file. Send photos to Ann Pike (baynews@baymoon.com) in a standard graphic format such as .jpg, .png or .tif. Include the name of the photographer, name of people shown and a brief description of what's going on in the body of the email. Replace automatic filenames with a short descriptive name. Finally, I have asked RVP Pesek to request review of the AIS policy that limits our ability to recognize young people in the Bulletin.

Present policy: "AIS policy prohibits the posting on the Internet of photos of youth identified in any way, such as by name, region, or club affiliation. The publication of photos of youth, identified or not, is permitted in AIS and related publications whose distribution is limited primarily to AIS members."

Suggested rewrite: "AIS policy requires written permission by the parent or guardian of a youth prior to the publication or posting on the Internet of photos of youth identified in any way, such as by name, contact information, region, or club affiliation. The editor of the publication or Internet site is responsible for securing and appropriately filing that permission."

There are pros and cons for this change. Your questions and comments are welcome.

In Memoriam

Region 14 of the American Iris Society recently lost two highly valued members: Margaret and George Sutton.

Margaret Sutton was known for her musical talents, including perfect pitch and an emotive quality to her performances. She served as organist for St. John's Episcopal Church in Tulare for more than twenty years. She also taught elementary band music in the Ukiah Unified School District for many years.

Margaret passed on April 23, 2013, after a lengthy illness, at the age of 78.

George Sutton passed on May 29, 2013, also after a lengthy illness, at the age of 80.

Margaret and her husband George established Sutton's Iris Gardens in Porterville, through which they provided exceptional irises and gained countless friends throughout the world. They also participated in creating the Porterville Iris Festival, which has become the signature event for that community.

Jeanne and Bob Plank expressed feelings that are shared by many friends of the Suttons: "Losing two such vibrant and creative individuals within a little more than a month's time is a difficult loss to assimilate. We are grateful for having been able to call them friends, and their unmatchable vitality will remain in a vivid and happy place in our memories."

On May 17, 2013 the AIS-14 Executive Board, acting through electronic messages, approved two actions in memory of Margaret Sutton: one donation in the amount of \$100 to the St. John's Episcopal Church Building Fund, and one donation in the amount of \$100 to the American Iris Society General Fund. The Executive Board may consider future actions in memory of George Sutton.





Abstract of the Minutes of the Executive Committee and General Meetings Spring Regional April 26–28, 2013, Roseville, CA

RVP John Pesek called to order the combined meeting of the Executive Committee and General Membership Meeting at 8:00 a.m., and asked for a moment of silence in memory of Margaret Sutton.

Approval of Minutes Fall Regional Meeting of October 27, 2012, as published November 1, 2012 in the Bulletin, with the addition of notice of the Larry Goldberg Award to David & Anna Cadd. MSC

Board Reports (see also the official minutes on the AIS-14 website)

Secretary Mary Sindicic: Late in January 2013, the Clara B. Rees Iris Society offered to host the 2013 Region 14 Fall Regional on October 18th & 19th, 2013. Due to time constraints, the board voted approval of the offer electronically. MSC

Judges Training Chair Phyllis Wilburn (see the report on page nine)

Directors Reports

Carol Dahout reported that Clara B. Rees IS will host the Fall Regional Conference on October 19th, probably at the Campbell Inn, in Campbell, California. The main speaker will be Riley Probst, on "Rebloomers."

Carolyn Hoover reported that Yosemite IS hosted its first iris show with 95 entries and three student youth entries. Terry Toney received twelve blue ribbons and the Silver Medal. At the show, Yosemite IS signed five new members and sold over \$300.00 of potted iris donated by the members. 50% of the proceeds went to the school's iris program.

Old Business

Allocate \$600 per issue to reimburse affiliates' costs for color printing of the AIS Region 14 Bulletin, at the rate of \$4.00 per copy, for AIS members who lack computer access. MSC

New Business

Proposed amendment to the AIS Region 14 Bylaws:

"Meetings of the Executive Board shall <u>may</u> be called by the RVP at each Fall and Spring Regional Conference, and at any other time deemed necessary for carrying on the business of Region 14.

Publish the proposed amendment in the AIS Region 14 Bulletin, for consideration during the 2013 Fall Regional General Meeting. MSC"

Accept High Desert Iris Society to host 2014 fall regional. MSC

Accept Yosemite Iris Society to host the 2015 Spring Regional. MSC

Publish an announcement or advertisement in the AIS Bulletin to invite AIS members who are not members of a Region 14 affiliate to download the AIS Region 14 Bulletin from the AIS Region 14 website. MSC

Announcements

RVP Pesek reported news from the AIS Convention:

AIS membership stands at 4,382 members, down 128 from last fall. There are 167 affiliates, with no change (the AIS lost five affiliates and picked up five, including Yosemite IS). The AIS changed the date for the affiliates to pay their \$25.00 affiliation fee from May 1st to April 30th. AIS needs a new editor for the Bulletin of the AIS.

Committee Reports

Spring 2013 Reports of Chairpersons of Standing Committees

Fund-Raising Chair Carolyn Craft

Carolyn Craft talked about how the raffle of the baskets and a fairy garden would work at the Regional and the silent auction. She invited new and different ideas for fundraising. Also, she asked presidents to pass her fundraising messages to their members. Several new members joined at the San Francisco Garden Show. Phyllis Wilburn shared that the Sacramento Iris Society has potted iris for sale at the conference; 50% of the proceeds will go to Region 14.

Historian Committee Chair Jean Richter

Jean Richter proposed that the Historian Committee keep two copies of each regional bulletin and sell or recycle the rest. RVP Pesek advised that the Standing Rules provide that there shall be a Historian who shall keep a file of the Region's historical records, including publications, and a scrapbook about Region activities and members for display at Regional meetings. Conclusion—the Standing Rules provide sufficient guidance for the Historian Committee.

Membership Chair Mary Ann Horton

Mary Ann Horton reported that there are 442 members.

Scholarship Chair Terri Hudson

In Terri Hudson's absence, Gordon Nicholson reported that ten students applied to the AIS Region 14 for its \$500.00 scholarship; five applicants were outstanding, two exceptional. AIS–14 started the scholarship program about 1996-1998, did not award the scholarship only one time over those years and awarded it twice to students of someone in the region. A committee of five readers and five voters always decide on the awards. James Fong was the winner this year of the AIS–14 \$500.00 youth scholarship. He is going to enroll at University of California, Davis. RVP Pesek commented that Terri Hudson sends 400 notices for the scholarship to schools in and around Nevada and Northern California.

Science Chair John Stremel

John Stremel demonstrated The Lytro Camera, a new camera technology (www.lytro.com), which could be useful as a tool in judges training: if you take a picture of an iris you could focus on the beard and then refocus on the clump. Cost is around \$400.00 and holds about 400 pictures. Jeanne Clay-Plank commented that Stremel's demonstration would be a great program for the affiliates, to update them on modern technology.

Trophies and Awards Bill Fink

Bill Fink explained the ballot and award process for the Spring Regional. RVP Pesek thanked David and Anna Cadd for many years of toting the trophies around and keeping everything up to date.

Youth Chair Lorraine Nicholson

Lorraine Nicholson reported that Region 14 has 79 youth memberships. The youth need not enter shows or have gardens, but she sends them letters and boxes of iris plants every year so that they will have a good early experience with gardening and later will join AIS. Each one of the youth members will receive an historic iris. RVP Pesek thanked Lorraine Nicholson for the terrific job she has done and commented that Region 14 has the highest number of youth of any Region in AIS.

Report of the Judges Training Chair

Phyllis Wilburn reported that we currently have 29 active students, four apprentices, 24 garden/exhibition judges, twelve master judges, and six emeritus judges. We have one apprentice that will move up to garden judge at the next training.

By June 1 of each year, all master, garden/exhibition judges, and apprentices must complete and return an Activity Report to the RVP and the Judges Training Chair. Failure to do so can result in disqualification as a judge. She will give Activity Report forms to those who are present, and the rest will be mailed. Remember that you must return two copies, one to the RVP and one to the JT Chair.

Watch the website for upcoming judges trainings (JTs). Chair Wilburn appreciates that everyone has been diligent about getting approvals for JT sessions and one-on-one training. She especially commends the judges who have taken their time and expertise to conduct trainings and tutor apprentices and students. On Sunday, June 9, 2013 at 10:00 am at the Shepard Garden and Arts Center in Sacramento, Chair Wilburn will conduct JT on "Awards and Ballots" primarily aimed at apprentices who need this training to be eligible to advance to garden/exhibition judge, but anyone could benefit from hearing this information. There will be a \$5.00 charge at the door to defray cost of the room and refreshments. Contact Phyllis if you are planning to come.

Additional judges training will be announced when scheduled. See the AIS-14 website for the most current information, and for the full schedule of judges trainings for 2013.



Ruth Ostroff's Garden

Participants at the Roseville regional were split into two groups to accommodate the lunch rush on Saturday. Most Santa Rosa members started in Ruth Ostroff's garden. Ruth's garden in Rio Linda encompassed two acres that were purchased in 2001. It started with a house, barn, and bare pasture with portable animal corrals. The 32 eucalyptus trees that once encircled the property have mostly been removed, replaced by the wonderful gardens that Ruth has created along with a lovely gazebo that overlooks these gardens. Amongst the multitude of irises are many California natives, water efficient plants, vegetables, roses, fruit trees, and a variety of other plantings.

Upon arrival we were greeted by a slate painting easel, which acted as a garden sign. Written in colored chalk was "2013 American Iris Society Regional Show Garden." In the garden were the many guest irises, a section of Fred Kerr irises, rebloomers, Dykes Medal winners, and door prize irises for the Sacramento I.S. Many iris beds were infiltrated by a multitude of California poppies in bloom. It was a gorgeous sight. Many irises were in



bloom here that were not blooming in the Horton garden and visa-versa. There were a multitude of impressive blooms by many hybridizers including Ghio, Keppel, Lauer, Tasco, Duncan, and the Cadds. Horton's Iris Garden and Farm

The beautiful entrance into the Horton's garden took us along a narrow one-way road that curved through the rolling hills. We drove past flowerbeds showcasing irises, antique farm equipment and granite boulders. The road took us by a small lake, then up over a crest and there before us lay the Horton Iris Garden and Farm in all of its glory. The "guest irises" came into view to our left, located on top of a knoll.

Lunch was first on the agenda. After we were fortified with nutrition, we headed up the knoll to examine the guest irises. As I approached them, 'Kachina Dancer' (Kerr 2010) was an instant eye catcher; undaunted by the heat, she stood tall and stately with her ruffled sunshine yellow standards. The falls are dark red with a narrow rim of lighter brown, edged again by a dark red rim. Five bloom stalks were gloriously in bloom.

'Ancient Charm' (Kerr 2011) displayed huge blooms, four bloom stalks, 7 buds, and 7 increases for next year's bloom. This one got added to my personal "want list." Another standout was 'Revision' (Keppel 2011), white with a blue band on the edge of the falls. Apparently I was not the only one to think that this was a standout, as it won the Out of Region Cup.

'Dragon King' (Tasco 2011), another favorite, has been performing nicely in every garden that I've seen it growing in this year. It consistently shows off very nice branching. The flowers will fade, but they still look nice. Huge clumps of 'Opposites' (Trio 2012) were performing beautifully with many bloom stalks and increases in both the Ostroff and Horton gardens. 
