## **2018 Fall Regional - MINUTES**

AIS Region 14 Fall Regional October 19-20, 2018 Sure-Stay Best Western Hotel Reno, Nevada

#### **Minutes of the Budget Meeting**

Jane Jordan, Secretary

Regional Vice President Phyllis Wilburn called the Budget meeting to order at 8:36 AM. She thanked the High Desert Iris Society for hosting the event and Patricia Eisenberg for chairing the event.

**Treasurer**, Helen Franklin, distributed copies of the budget and treasurer's report. The budget shows \$12,420 in expenses and \$5600 in revenues, resulting in a shortfall of \$6820. Clarification of the expenses (\$3500) for youth program, Classroom Iris Project for 400 youth, explained that region pays their \$8 dues. The youth members will get the AIS bulletin, newsletters, projects, writing contests, iris culture, and mock show. The 2019 National Convention was not included in the budget report and should be a line item. Shirley Trio-Probst took the floor to discuss the budget for the 2019 National. The Budget shows \$96,750 in income and \$98,214 in expenses, making a shortfall of \$1467. The plan assumes attendance of 225. \$1500 seed money has been received from the 2018 National in Louisiana. Several affiliates have already made donations to the National. Monetary donations from affiliates should be sent to Linda Hood. AIS is not doing a Silent Auction, so Region 14 can do the Silent Auction and collect the profits. The final Saturday Awards Banquet will be in the Roundhouse Conference Center across the street. Shirley will provide a list of Committee chairs. Jean Richter is registrar and is making the bags. The pins are done. The region will be using 'Paypal Here' for the registration.

John Pesek moved that the 2019 Budget be accepted with the addition of a line item for the 2019 National. Lynn Williams seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The Budget meeting adjourned at 9:21 AM.

#### **Minutes of the General Meeting**

RVP Phyllis Wilburn called the meeting to order at 9:24 AM. She thanked the High Desert Iris Society and Patricia Eisenberg for hosting the event.

Roll Call was taken.

**Judges' Training Chair,** Alleah Haley reported that Region 14 has the largest Judges' Training Program in the country. The region held 9 Judges' training sessions this year. There are 89 folks in the training program. We had 4 apprentices move up to G/E judges – Cindy Eastman, Mark Greene, Kurt Kilburn, and Amberlee Pick; 3 students move up to apprentice – Carol Cullen, Gary Prevost, and Craig Tarr; 3 new students – Jeff Bennet, Kathy Hutchinson, and Lori Peterson; One retired judge reactivated to active Master Judge – Bryce Williamson. The All Star Judge Award, an engraved acrylic star, for the accredited judge with the most JT hours went to Douglas Kanarowski and Phyllis Wilburn who each had 12 JT hours. The apprentice with the most JT hours was Cindy Eastman with 18.5 hours. Judges' training reports will be sent to all judges and apprentices in the next week.

**Secretary,** Jane Jordan, reported that board approved via email transferring an addition \$3000 to the 2019 National Convention bank account and setting up a new account with the Bank of the Sierra with Linda Hood and Helen Franklin as signers.

John Pesek moved that the minutes from the 2018 Spring Regional General Meeting be accepted. Terri Toney seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

**Bulletin Editor,** Shirley Trio-Probst, apologized that the August Bulletin was not as yet published. She just received the bulletin in final form this morning and will distribute it tonight via email. Shirley announced that she is retiring as Bulletin Editor. Jean Richter will select a volunteer to take over the position. Stephanie Jennings of HDIS also volunteered.

**Treasurer,** Helen Franklin, reported that there is \$37,978.02 cash on hand. Expenses to date are \$9,679. Revenues to date are \$9,555.

**Central Director,** Craig Tarr, thanked Phyllis Wilburn, RVP, for hosting the hospitality suite last evening. Craig reported on the memberships and activities of Clara B. Rees Iris Society, Monterey Bay Iris Society, Mount Diablo Iris Society, and Sydney B. Mitchell Iris Society.

**Southern Director,** Terri Toney, reported on the activities of the San Joaquin Iris Society, Yosemite Iris Society, and Fresno Iris Society. James M. Gibson Iris Society did not sent a report.

Northern Director, Anna Cadd, apologized that she did not have a report. She retired in April and has been on the road most of the time.

**Immediate-past President,** John Pesek, reported that the nominating committee of Anna Cadd, Patricia Eisenberg, Linda Hood, Joe Lawrence, Craig Tarr, Terri Toney, and himself met at the 2018 Spring Regional and interviewed 2 candidates for Regional Vice President – Jean Richter and Riley Probst. The committee voted by secret ballot and nominated Jean Richter for the position of RVP. The committee also nominated Alleah Haley as assistant RVP and Judges' Training Chair.

**Regional Events Coordinator,** Kathy Braaten, announced that she is retiring from the position. She thanked the High Desert Iris Society for hosting this event. The 2019 Spring Regional meeting will take place at the 2019 National Convention. Affiliates are needed to host the 2019 Fall Regional and the 2020 Spring Regional. **Honorary Awards Chair,** Kathy Braaten, and her committee of Marilyn Kaplan, Patricia Eisenberg, and Linda Hood selected Helen Franklin, current Region 14 Treasurer, to receive the Larry Gaulter Award for exceptional service to Region 14. Helen has been Region 14 Treasurer since 2005. She also was refreshment chair for 8 gardens in the 2004 National Convention hosted by Region 14. She is assisting the treasurer to the 2019 National and has been instrumental in keeping the Porterville Festival alive. Kathy will be retiring as Honorary Awards Chair and Marilyn Kaplan will take over the position.

**Fundraising Chair,** Carolyn Craft, thanked Helen Franklin and Marilyn Kaplan for filling in her at the 2018 Spring Regional. She reported that the baskets and Silent Auction earned \$916 and the iris sale earned \$939. She announced that she, Lynn Williams, and Marilyn Kaplan will organize a silent auction for the 2019 National Convention. Riley Probst thanked Carolyn and Wayne Craft for a job will done in spite of health problems.

**Historian**, Jean Richter, noted that there are some historic items in the silent auction. She did some research on one of our region hybridizers who will be having a significant birthday.

Internet Chair, Ann Pike, was not present and sent no report.

**Membership Chair,** Mary Ann Horton, reported that Region 14 has 635 AIS members, 306 of whom are youth. Phyllis asked the affiliates to encourage their members to join AIS by offering AIS membership as a prize.

**Scholarship Chair,** Barbara Kitz, announced the recipients of the Region 14 scholarships for students pursuing a career in horticulture or related fields. Linsey Swall of Tulare received a \$1000 scholarship and Kaitlyn O'Dell of Sierra Foothills received a \$750 scholarship. Both these women were extremely qualified and committed to the field of agriculture. Barbara distributed copies of the scholarship application form and asked the affiliates to forward them to high schools and colleges in their area. She would like each affiliate to designate a scholarship liaison. She also needs 4 individuals to be on the reading/evaluating committee. The deadline for the 2019-20 scholarship is March 29, 2019. Barbara thanked the affiliates that donated to the scholarship fund.

Science Chair, Riley Probst, noted that at this meeting there are 40 females and 15 males. He asked the men to encourage their men friends grow iris. Riley announced his resignation, but will continue if requested. He responded to several questions that had been submitted to him. 1) What causes an iris stalk to grow crooked? The answers are weather, lack of water, or too much water. 2) Are some iris more fertile than others? The answer is yes. In some cases the stigmatic lip is more open. 3) Can an iris be introduced with unknown parentage? The answer is yes.

**Trophies and Awards Chair,** Bill Fink, thanked Anna Cadd and Marilyn Kaplan for filling in for him at the 2018 Spring Regional. He presented the keeper awards for the winners of the voting from the 2018 Spring Regional guest iris gardens. Bill Tyson received the Knopf Cup for best seedling 01-20-1. Paul Black received the Out of Region Award for Luxuriant. Robert Annand received the Cotillion Cup for Sky Beat, the best current introduction by a Region 14 hybridizer. Doug Kanarowski received the Clara B. Rees Cup for Baby Duck, the best introduced iris prior to the current year by a Region 14 hybridizer. Bob Hollingworth received the Melrose cup for Siberian Judy, Judy, Judy, the best beardless. Lynda Miller received the Jim Gibson Cup for Blushing Grapes, the best plicata. Chuck Bunnel received the Hager-Dubose Memorial Cup for Gesundheit, the best bearded iris other than tall.

Youth Chair, Lorraine Nicholson, was not present. She has submitted her resignation.

**2019 National Convention Chair,** Shirley Trio-Probst, delivered her report during the budget meeting.

**Tall Bearded Symposium Chair,** Riley Probst, announced the winners of the Symposium for Region 14, That's All Folks, and for all of AIS, Dusky Challenger.

#### **New Business**

**Southern Director.** Terri Toney's term as Southern Director is over. Linda Hood was nominated for the position. Riley Probst moved that Linda Hood's nomination be accepted. Helen Franklin seconded the motion. The motion passed.

**Regional Vice-president.** Lynn Williams moved that the nomination of Jean Richter as RVP and Alleah Haley as Assistant RVP and Judges' Training Chair be accepted. Helen Franklin seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Phyllis Wilburn, outgoing RVP, thanked all the officers and committee chairs and members who have graciously supported her during her tenure. Phyllis welcomed Jean Richter as RVP and passed the gavel on to her. Jean expressed thanks for the opportunity to serve the Region. She expressed her appreciation for the members who are so supportive of Region 14.

Alleah Haley, ARVP, thanked Phyllis for her service and presented her with a thank you gift, a \$100 gift certificate from Aitken's Salmon Creek Gardens and a past RVP pin.

Patricia Eisenberg announced that lunch is a sandwich buffet in the hallway. A meeting room is available for committee meetings. She also thanked people who brought flowers for the show which became a Mock show for training. She thanked the judges and everyone who brought Silent Auction items. She thanked Barbara Jean Mills for making the centerpieces and cards. There will be another trip to the Arboretum and Moana Nursery Sunday morning.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:16 PM.

### **Remembering the Nelsons - by Bryce Williamson**

It was with sadness that I learned of the deaths of Iris Irene and John Nelson. Iris and John were pivotal figures in the Clara B. Rees Iris Society and served as a bridge between the founding members and the next generation of iris growers, with John serving as president of the Clara B. for three years. In addition, Iris and John were active on the regional level, attended national conventions, and regularly trekked to Region 13 for bloom season. There they had become good friends with Gus Schreiner.

By trade, John was a veterinarian with clinics in Campbell and Santa Clara, CA. It was in the back space of the Campbell clinic that John was able to grow irises and raise seedlings. John was especially fond of pinks, oranges, and flowers with lace. Keith Keppel introduced John's Fantasy Faire - an orchid pink with good lace.

John's Private Dancer was a tall, well-formed peach pink with husky growth and I was always surprised that it was not more popular. His oranges, Tangerine Dream and Modern Music, were equal to any oranges introduced in that time frame. His most popular introduction, another heavily laced iris, was Feminine Wiles. This lavender-orchid flushed pink was used with great success by other hybridizers.

Iris Irene dabbled in hybridizing, mainly plicatas. Her Paprika Fono's, a red-brown plicata with yellow grounds, is still widely grown in mild climates due to its ease of rebloom.

One of her seedlings was the pollen parent of Jesse's Song; however, Iris's greatest achievement was chairing the two very successful San Jose AIS National conventions. Having had good experience planning large swim events due to her sons' involvement in that sport, I never ceased to be amazed with her understanding of the overview of a national and her command of even small details. Joe Gatty named the pink Iris Irene for her.

Iris and John had two sons, Scott and Nicholas. In addition, Iris raised Siamese cats. Her Betsy was famous—when they brought Nick home, Betsy slept with him for the next 18 years. Space in the Saratoga home garden was limited, partly due to the extra-large and extra-deep swimming pool for their sons, but on a slope by the pool they grew named varieties. One year they brought in the Queen of the Show with an amazingly clean, blemish free stalk of Edenite.

They will be greatly missed.

## **Bacterial Soft Rot—by Anna Cadd**

It's January 1 and I am sitting in Poland starting to pack my suitcases to return home. The days are getting visibly longer, so I think that the first thing I will do when I get home will be to check my iris beds for bacterial soft rot.

Rain, while refreshing and absolutely necessary for all living creatures, can be a not-so-good thing for bearded irises. It can lead to rot. Tall bearded irises seem to be more impacted than the smaller ones. Bacterial rot can happen no matter the temperature. Bearded irises do not like to have their roots and/or rhizomes soaked with water for a prolonged period of time. Rot can happen quickly and can be deadly for irises.

Be observant! While our neighbors might think we are a bit strange, slowly and carefully looking at nothing but green iris leaves with not a bloom in sight ; the earlier we attack rot, the better our chances are of saving the rhizome. The outer leaves may turn yellow or the entire fan may be lying on the ground – these are definite signs of rot. The smell of bacterial soft rot is that of a rotten potato - very unpleasant, downright icky! Push on the top of the rhizome. If rot is present, the rhizome will be mushy. Sometimes maggots or small worms are already present.



Soft rot is a disease caused by *Erwinia carotovora*, a bacterial phytopathogen. *Erwinia carotovora* (*Ec*) is widespread in nature and different strains affect many vegetable and horticultural crops. It typically enters the iris rhizome via an injury to the plant. Wounds that provide access for the bacteria can be created by borers, slugs, snails, beetle larvae, wind damage, cultivation, animals or even careless leaf or stalk removal.

*Ec* secretes multiple enzymes that degrade the cell walls of the iris. This allows the bacteria to spread into the rhizome and leaf bases. In experiments with calla lilies, researchers found that bacterial production peaks at 82.5° F, while enzyme production peaks at 57.2° F. Therefore, the bacteria get a foothold in the plant during warmer, drier parts of the year; but soft rot problems don't appear until the cooler weather in the spring or fall, when enzyme production is highest.

Leaves turn yellow, wilt, and eventually die. Dieback often starts at the leaf tips and progresses downward. The entire leaf cluster may be found lying on the ground. If pulled gently, the leaf cluster sometimes lifts off the rhizome. Leaf bases and rhizomes are often rotted and foul smelling.



As infection develops, the plant tissue decays into a soft, foul-smelling mass. Finally, the plant dies and the inner rhizome tissue disintegrates. Infection and rapid decay are favored by moist, dark conditions. These bacteria live in the soil and in plant debris. They are spread by contaminated plants and rhizomes, soil, insects, and tools.

If you find rot, you can dig the infected rhizome. Digging this late in the season might be problematic - to dig the rhizome out and get it re-established again. Irises need about 6 weeks to establish new roots. Whether you dig out the rhizome or not - you must clean out all the infected tissues. You can use a sharp knife to cut out the rot. THROW THE ROTTED tissue away! Do not leave it in your flowerbed. DO NOT reuse the knife until you have thoroughly cleaned it with soap and water or dipped it in rubbing alcohol. Once the rot has been removed, you can apply several types of products that may work to stop the rot.

There is a lot of inaccurate information on treatment of this problem, even from normally credible sources. If the rot is extensive, you should dig up the plant; but if only a portion of a plant is infected, the plant can be treated in place. Since the soil immediately surrounding the infected plant has very high *Ec* levels, it is best to scrape away and dispose of that as well and replace it with uncontaminated soil. With a sharp knife, cut off the rotted portion of rhizome and leaves, and put into the trash. Do not add diseased leaves and rhizomes to your compost pile! Make sure you cut back the rhizome to all white healthy tissue.

At this point you have several options for sanitizing the rhizome. You can dip the cut rhizome in a 10% or stronger bleach solution or apply the solution to the rhizome with a sponge if you are treating the plant in place. In both cases, leave the rhizome exposed and let it air dry for a couple days before putting soil around it again.

You can also use either a chlorine-based powdered cleanser like Comet® or garden sulfur, a.k.a. elemental sulfur, to coat the cut ends and sprinkle around the affected area. Both the chlorine and the sulfur create an inhospitable environment for *Ec* but in different ways. The chlorine bleach is a strong base with a pH of 12.6, which makes the treated area alkaline. Sulfur on the other hand lowers the pH and creates an acidic environment; a pH of 5.2 has been shown to be protective against the pathogen. Sulfur should only be used when temperatures are below 80° F. Don't use sulfate forms of sulfur, since they will not lower the pH. Since bearded irises prefer neutral pH soils for growth, don't over apply whichever treatment you choose. Usually, the replanted rhizome will survive, though it may not bloom that year.

The best treatment, however, is prevention; and proper cultural practices can dramatically reduce the occurrence of soft rot in your garden. Careful planting and garden hygiene should create many enjoyable years of healthy trouble-free irises.

Happy gardening. Don't give up on affected irises They can often be saved. They just need our help getting through the wet season to bloom for us in the spring.

## **Judges' Training Report**

We have 92 folks enrolled in JT including: 29 Garden/Exhibition (G/E) judges, 7 Master judges, 4 Emeritus judges, 11 Retired judges, 7 Apprentices, and 24 Active Students (Candidates).

Four new Garden/Exhibition judges were approved by the AIS Board last fall: Cindy Eastman of Grass Valley, Mark Greene of Los Gatos, Kurt Kilburn of Pismo Beach, and Amberlee Pick of Coarsegold. Mark, Kurt, and Amberlee fulfilled their requirements to advance from Apprentice to G/E in one year.

We have 3 new Apprentice judges: Carol Cullen of Chico, Gary Prevost of San Jose, and Craig Tarr of Soquel.

Last year we gained one G/E judge from Texas – Alex Harding of Vacaville. One retired judge reactivated to active Master judge: Bryce Williamson of Campbell. One Master judge retired – Joyce Ragle of Carmichael.

We lost 2 Master judges last year for failure to meet AIS requirements. One G/E judge moved out of the Region – Ross BeVier moved to Washington, Region 13.

We have 5 new Student judges: Jeff Bennett of Hercules, Susan Duncan of Reno, Elaine Fischer of Sunnyvale, Kathy Hutchinson of Durham, and Lori Peterson of Oakhurst.

There was a tie for the Region 14 All Star Judge Award last year – the accredited AIS judge with the most Judges' Training hours in 2017-18 judges' training year: 1<sup>st</sup> year judge Douglas Kanarowski of Mariposa and outgoing RVP Phyllis Wilburn of Rescue. Both accrued 12 JT hours. Runners-up were Carolyn Hoover of Coarsegold and Mary Ann Horton of Loomis, both with 10.5 hours. The Apprentice with the greatest number of JT hours was Cindy Eastman of Auburn, with a whopping 18.5 hours! We had 9 JT sessions last year, and 2 so far this JT year (August 1, 2018 – July 31, 2019): one on MTBs by Emeritus Judge Lynda Miller at the Fall Regional meeting in Reno, and one on Spurias by Master Judge Anna Cadd at the Sydney B. Mitchell Iris Society winter potluck in January. Anna will give 1 hour of JT at the Santa Rosa Iris Society meeting on February 11.

I encourage individuals and societies to schedule JT classes this year and notify me so I can approve them. I would really like someone to host a garden session on SDBs, taught by an accredited AIS judge. Both classroom and garden JT sessions will be given at the National Convention headquartered in San Ramon, California on April 24-27, and I strongly encourage all participants in the Region 14 JT program to register and attend.

A field trip is planned to tour the Hoover Iris Garden and Bill Tyson's Hillside Garden, both in Coarsegold, CA.
