In addition to the guest irises, these gardens have an abundance of other blooms and many recent introductions, including an extensive collection of Fred Kerr's irises that will add to the pleasure of your visit. We expect the blooms to put on a spectacular show for this regional meeting, and we are excited to share this display with you. Lunch will be in the garden. Car pools will be organized for the garden visits, as the gardens are easy driving distance from the

hotel. There will be a seedling show, and entries are encouraged.

Iris Bio for Fred Kerr


I first started growing and hybridizing irises in about 1955, while still in high school. My early interests were black irises and tangerine bearded white iris. I remember one of the first crosses was Frost and Flame X Ballerina and another was Iris balkana with a tangerine bearded pink. This last cross should have been enough to put me off hybridizing for life! The seedlings were all an

> unattractive red purple shade with long, dog-eared falls.

University and job pursuits made growing iris impossible and I made no further iris crosses until 1988 when my partner and I got a three acre patch of ground. We have grown and hybridized iris and daylilies ever since. Our commercial garden is called Rainbow Acres and we sell our own iris and daylily introductions as well as those of other hybridizers.

I have to date introduced 137 irises, all but about four have been tall bearded. Our iris intros have accumulated 17 Honorable Mentions, six Award of Merits, one Knowlton Medal, two Wister Medals and one Dykes Medal. In addition 'Queen's Circle' has been awarded an Award of Garden Merit from the British Iris Society as well as a Silver Medal in Florence,

My hybridizing goals include the production of iris that grow well, advance color patterns and have excellent branching and, above all, good form. Rebloom has not been a major goal, but at least a dozen of my introductions have been reported to rebloom, most reliably, in Region 15. I have grown seedling crops ranging from a few hundred to a few thousand each year. In turn I have introduced 6 to 10 new varieties each year. I am a Master Judge of

I frequently speak to iris clubs about my hybridizing programs.

Pursuing AIS Educational Mission

Members of the Monterey Bay Iris Society were impressed by last year's display of Pacific Coast Irises in bloom at the Palace of Fine Arts. The Society for Pacific Coast Native Irises posted this photo of the display on its website.

This display in a popular public park introduces gardeners to California's native irises, and hopefully encourages them to include this beautiful plant in their own gardens.

This idea came to the attention of the Monterey Bay Iris Society at a time when several members have commented that they have filled their available spaces with tall bearded irises, PCIs or other iris species. While they could still find ways to plant more irises (including replacing older with newer introductions), they have rediscovered the mission of the AIS, which is to "promote the culture and improvement of the genus iris."


The MBIS, like other Region 14 societies, pursues this essentially educational mission publicly through its plant sales and shows, and privately through the informational programs during its meetings.

We might augment those initiatives by developing a display garden in a public area, to demonstrate exemplary plants in the iris family.

We approached Director Brett Hall of the University of California Santa Cruz Arboretum with that idea, and


found that the Arboretum has both a commitment to public education about many aspects of horticulture and a strong interest in California native plants. The Arboretum is oriented to woody plants (i.e., trees and shrubs), but it already has Pacific Coast Irises in scattered spots within its California Native Garden, and Director Hall was immediately supportive of the concept of a prominent PCI display garden.

Arboretum Director Hall and California Native Garden Curator Rick Flores soon designated an area that the MBIS could develop as a PCI Display garden. The Friends of the Arboretum already has a volunteer team that weeds the California Native Garden, so we anticipate that this project will not create new maintenance burdens.



These two beds, which are surrounded by paved paths, total close to 300 and 600 square feet, respectively.

The Arboretum spreads over seventy-five acres so we were pleased discover that these beds are prominently located close to the entrance of the facility. In the following diagram, they are below the word "Entrance."



Each of these beds already has a noteworthy and mature California native shrub from southern California's Channel Islands.

The smaller bed has a Shinyleaf Mahonia (*Mahonia pinnata ssp. insularis* 'Shnitemoon'), which is very rare and federally listed as an endangered species. It is known only from Santa Cruz Island.

The larger bed has a Channel Island Tree Poppy (*Dendromicon harfordii*), a highly prized bush that is rare in cultivation and hard to produce. It is also native to the Santa Cruz, Santa Cruz and Santa Catalina Islands. We will protect those significant shrubs, but these beds also have a variety of smaller, common California native shrubs that we plan to relocate within the Arboretum or donate to volunteers. Spaces between the shrubs are planted with Rusty Sedge (*Carex subfusca*), which we will remove to make space for the display of PCIs.

We will plant the larger bed in the spring with a selection of different species of Pacific Coast Irises, which we would start from seed as soon as possible, and the smaller bed with divisions of hybrid PCIs, to be collected in the fall of 2013.

The Society for Pacific Coast Native Irises (SPCNI) has generously offered to donate seeds for this project, and we have received supplies of the following seeds:

Iris douglasiana	lavender to white—from Columbia

Given the guideline to plant the PCIs ten inches on center, our volunteers will plant close to 300 seedlings.

The Arboretum has provided outdoor space near the Arboretum's greenhouse where we will keep the seedlings moist and convenient to the planting area. In the spring, after we have planted these seedlings, we will move on to Phase II: lining up representative hybrids for division and planting. That should occur in the fall of 2013.

Phase III will consist of developing and placing institutional-quality interpretive signs in the PCI display beds and preparing printed materials for Arboretum visitors. This project is now at the early stages of Phase I and

This project is now at the early stages of Phase I and months away from realizing its public educational purposes. Look for brief progress reports in future issues of the Bulletin.

Meanwhile, other Region 14 societies might look for similar educational opportunities within their own areas. Public botanical gardens, in comparison to an educational institution's garden, might support a display of a wider range of popular garden plants, e.g., tall bearded iris hybrids.

Developing and maintaining a public display of Pacific Coast Irises or other members of the *Iridaceae* family requires time, energy and other resources, and can yield high levels of satisfaction for society members.

Future Regional Meetings

Regional Meeting Plans

In July 2012, the Santa Rosa Iris Society (SRIS) proposed to host the 2013 Fall Regional Meeting, and that plan was quickly approved.

Then, early in August 2012, the SRIS offered to host the 2014 Spring Regional Meeting instead of the 2013 Fall Regional Meeting. That plan was approved, but it left the 2013 Fall Regional Meeting without a host.

Late in January 2013, the Clara B. Rees Iris Society (CBRIS) offered to host the 2013 Region 14 Fall Regional on October 18 & 19, 2013. The Region's bylaws provide that regional meeting plans shall be approved by the general membership at least one year in advance. There was no time to convene the general membership to respond to CBRIS's timely offer so early in February 2013 that offer was approved through email voting. In July 2012, then-RVP Jeanne Plank proposed that the AIS-14 Region should host the 2014 Fall Regional Meeting, convene it in Fort Bragg, and include a tour of Pacific Coast Irises at the Mendocino Botanical Garden. The executive committee, the standing committee chairs and the affiliate presidents have expressed interest in this plan, so it will be considered by the membership at a regional meeting.
